

FROM THE PRINCIPAL OF THE ROES

In recent years Hollywood has produced a plethora of superhero movies. It seems we have a fascination for the heroic and find pleasure in watching justice being served to powerful villains who are set to destroy the world. Bill Delvaux in his book, 'Hero: The True Path to Manhood', claims that this desire for superheroes is intrinsically hardwired in us, as people made in the image of God. He goes on to say that this forces us to search for qualities that are good and true.

Vishal Mangalwadi, in 'The Book that Made Your World', traces the history of the hero. He claims that the idea of the hero has changed from a great conquering king, such as Alexander the Great, to a person who is willing to sacrifice their own life for another. Vishal believes that this paradigm shift is because of the crucified Christ, who gave his life in service to others.

Research conducted into the theme of heroes seems to agree with Vishal's conclusions. The three main character traits of a hero include:

- Acting voluntarily for the service of others who are in need, whether it is for an individual, a group or a community.
- Performing actions without any expectation of reward or external gain
- Recognition and acceptance of the potential risk or sacrifice made by taking heroic actions.

So what does heroism have to do with school? The growth in adolescent film and literature, shows a culture searching for identity through the depiction of the hero. The Bible says that each of us are called to be heroes, to lay down our lives in the service of God and others. By living in this way people and communities, including schools, thrive.

A classroom filled with heroes will see young men and women strive to learn so they can make a difference in the world. It will see people stand up for the things that are right.

The Bible shows that there is only one true hero, and that is Jesus; perfect in humility and obedience, even to death on a cross. Through him and in him is our only chance to become true heroes. The more we look to our own strength the more we realise what we are lacking. It is in Jesus alone that we live and move and have our being, and we become the most heroic when we acknowledge that we can't do things in our own strength but through Christ alone.

In Term 1 this year we will explore the theme of heroes with our students. We hope that this will help them reflect on how we are called to serve Jesus and others in our lives here at Carinya. Heroism is not just one act of bravery, but looking for ways to serve others day by day, in the classroom and playground.

But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven. 

EXCURSIONS

NAIDOC Week is a great opportunity to appreciate and celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history, culture and achievements. In 2020 the theme was "Always Was, Always Will Be". This theme acknowledges that the Indigenous Aboriginal people have lived on this continent for over 65,000 years.

Throughout the week, students across the whole school enjoyed learning more about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and history each morning in pastoral care. Each day we presented a short video, sharing thoughts on the NAIDOC theme, local stories, reconciliation and the Gamilaroi language. Students also enjoyed making a yarning circle, designing and painting totem poles, and learning about Indigenous art with Mrs Kaliela Thornton. Mrs Thornton shared with students the different styles of Aboriginal artwork, including painted emu eggs and possum skins. Students then enjoyed a variety of artworks, especially the hand painting!

It was a great time to enjoy how, through Jesus, we are all made differently, each one with our own gifts and abilities. The Bible celebrates diversity and it is so important to appreciate and value how each one of us is fearfully and wonderfully made in the image of God.

DISCIPLINE

is **NOT** a dirty word

We have seen a significant change in the way children are disciplined, both at home and at school. While some of these changes have been positive, we could be left with a generation of children who are making poor choices without consequences and are struggling to learn from their mistakes.

Whoever loves discipline loves knowledge, but whoever hates correction is foolish. - Proverbs 12:1

At Carinya, we seek to discipline children in a way which reflects the character of God. This means teachers promote a classroom environment which encourages a commitment to the Lord Jesus in their work and actions towards others. Students are to respond in recognition of God's grace and in warm acceptance to the gifts that have been given to them and others from Christ, and for His glory.

Learning in community is a privilege and students are encouraged to find the "reward in the task". This helps them to own their learning, see themselves as learners and work in a spirit of community rather than competition.

Students will at times inevitably make mistakes. Apart from the most significant behaviour, students are provided with opportunities to grow and learn from their mistakes. When a disciplinary matter occurs, the matter is clarified and when required, reported back to parents. Working out why the child made a bad choice needs to be realised before taking the steps to help them get it right the next time. Home and school working together at this stage is the most powerful way of creating change. When needed, apologies and an opportunity for reconciliation are provided. Depending on the issue, children may find consequences imposed on them which can include withdrawal from privileges, such as losing their lunchtime play.

Discipline your children, and they will give you peace; they will bring you the delights you desire.

- Proverbs 12:1

If a child continues to be disobedient and non-compliant, then further measures will be taken to try to find out why the behaviour is taking place. This could include a referral to our psychologist, or teaching children some skills to help them "get it right" at school. Other measures, such as student profile books and withdrawal from class, will also be considered. At each step, care is taken to ensure students are treated fairly and parents are informed.

While sometimes difficult, it is important that home and school work together through this process. Children can quickly take the opportunity to play home off against school and suddenly the poor behaviour becomes replaced with blaming the school for what has happened.

While difficult, children respond best when there are boundaries in place. It helps to create a safe learning environment that places the community over the individual. Qualities of trust, honesty, cooperation, empathy, gratitude and integrity are established when students are disciplined in a kind and caring learning environment.

We look forward to working with you this year in the education of your child. More than ever, kids need help to know right from wrong and be equipped to make the best choices for their learning and relationships at school. Therefore 'discipline' is not a dirty word, rather it is an opportunity to create positive, lasting change in a child.



2020 was a striking year in many ways; bushfires, floods, COVID-19, and lockdowns all made their mark on our school community. Year 12 students rose to the challenge and completed their Higher School Certificate amidst a very unusual set of circumstances, which included a whole series of cancelled excursions and restricted events.

Wonderfully, we were able to celebrate Year 12's efforts using live streaming technologies for their Final Assembly, and then met together in the PAC for the Graduation Dinner. Christian School State Cricket KNOCKOUT!

PRIMARY

After travelling to Sydney early in 2020 and winning back to back CSSA Super 8's titles, Carinya's primary boys cricket team claimed the Primary Christian School State Cricket Knockout victory at Singleton in Term 4, 2020.

Weekly training, combined with team work and faithful dedication, helped the team win the first two Knockout games, leading to the third and final game against Inaburra School. Carinya batted first, with five batters getting over 15 runs, going on to take the win the match by 74 runs, in an all-round effort.

Although the final margin was a comfortable one, the opposing team played well with a key player achieving around 40 not out half way through the game. With a couple of strong batting partnerships, Carinya took the wicket that got the opposing team's key batter out.

The team not only showed incredible skill at cricket throughout 2020, but also showed great character in their integrity and sportsmanship, enjoying their gifts from the Lord Jesus and glorifying him in their efforts.

SECONDARY

The U15 and Opens Knockout cricket teams have both progressed into the 2nd round of the Secondary Christian School State Cricket Knockout Competition with strong results in our first round games, seeing both teams bowling Belmont Christian College out of less than 30 runs.

The Opens Knockout team is into the final 8 teams of the Douglas Shield Competition (State Wide Independent schools). The team beat Hunter Valley Grammar School by 100 runs in the first round and followed it up with beating Macquarie College by 7 wickets. The next opponent is St Philip's Christian College Cessnock, which will be played early in Term 1, 2021. In their 3 matches so far, the opens team have scored 558 runs, with a lot of strong partnerships between different batsmen. This was supported by the bowlers and fielders, with 5 bowlers taking 2 or more wickets in the 3 matches.

Students in Years 5-10 also have access to the WTE Online Toolbox, where they can practise their writing skills in class and at home; AI technology assesses for fluency, concision and precision. While the learning of new skills can be time consuming and take time out of the curriculum, the Write That Essay program beautifully works in conjunction with our existing pedagogy and classroom practices.

MIRACLE 1 - Jesus tells nature what to do

Read Mark 4:35-41



1. What does this miracle tell us about Jesus' power? Ancient cultures believed the sea was a symbol of unstoppable power and destruction, uncontrollable by anyone except God. Notice that Jesus did not conjure something or call on a greater power to calm the storm. When Jesus does this miracle he is not saying ... I am someone with access to power ... he is saying ... I am power.

2. Why were the disciples terrified of Jesus? Should we ever be?



MIRACLE 2 - Jesus tells demons what to do

Read Mark 5:1-20



1. What does this miracle tell us about Jesus? This man in every way has become a slave to Satan. In this miracle, Jesus is giving us a glimpse into what he is going to do at the cross. He will smash the power of Satan in the lives of his people and restore them back to what God made them to be.

2. What do you find terrifying about the story? There is a terrifying reality that is unseen; we are either a servant of Christ or a slave of Satan. Jesus' work was to take people from the realm of Satan and into his realm. No one else can rescue people like this.

<u>3.</u> What is alarming about the end of the story? These people meet Jesus face to face. They see his great power and they ask him to leave!



MIRACLE 3 + 4 - Jesus tells death and sickness what to do

Read Mark 5:21-43



1. What does this miracle tell us about Jesus? In this section of Mark we meet two desperate people. The first is Jairus, a rich and very religious man who is desperately anxious for his only child. By the time Jesus reaches Jairus, his daughter has died. Jesus sits down next to the girl, takes her by the hand and says two things to her - 'Talitha', which literally means 'little girl', and 'Koum', which means 'arise'. Jesus is facing death, the most implacable, unstoppable enemy of the human race, and such is his power that he holds this child by the hand and lifts her through it. Why did Jesus delay his arrival until the child had died? I think Jairus got to see things about Jesus that day that no one had ever seen. Others had seen powerful healings, but he saw a powerful resurrection.


The second is a woman who had a constant flow of blood for 12 years and is considered unclean before God under the law of Moses. She would not have been allowed in this crowd and anyone who touched her would also be considered unclean under the Mosaic law. The woman knows that the law says that if Jesus comes into contact with her, he will be as unclean as she is. But when she touches him, Jesus doesn't become unclean ... she becomes clean. Why do you think Jesus asks who it was who touched him? (Of course Jesus already knew!). I think she thought that if Jesus knew her situation he would not touch her. She wants a miracle, but Jesus wants a meeting. He wants her to know that he knows that he healed her!

Here is Jesus, overflowing with gigantic power and at the same time is full of compassion and mercy. Jesus calls on us to trust him in life and in death.


