Discipline

Over the years discipline has become a dirty word associated with punishment and authority. Modern culture has changed the concept of discipline from something helpful to something that is punitive and unwelcomed.

The word discipline actually comes from the Latin word, *disiplina*, meaning instruction and training. Its root word, *discere*, means to learn. Through understanding this definition, discipline becomes a necessary part of bringing up children, caring for them and preparing them for life. Discipline, therefore, should be a word which says from parent to child, "We are in this together, I love you so much that I am willing to make life difficult for both of us in the short term, so together we can enjoy the long term."

Whoever heeds discipline shows the way to life, but whoever ignores correction leads others astray. Proverbs 10:17

When thinking about discipline it is best to keep things simple. Here are some thoughts I have found helpful.

Who is in Charge?

Children will continually be working out the fundamental question of "Who is in charge?" This question is asked in the classroom as well as in families. During the different stages of development children will push against boundaries using tantrums, tears, phrases like "everybody else is doing it" and playing parents off against each other. Children, like ourselves, want what they think is best for them. A parent's job is to work out what is right for them. We all know that we as parents make plenty of mistakes, however God placed us in this position to raise children. When children know you are in charge they will relax more in your care and enjoy the boundaries that are afforded to them.

Decisions Today Matter Tomorrow

Any parent will agree that disciplining children is hard, it takes time, patience and perseverance. Children have a unique way of making you question whether your decisions are right. It is important to remember that how you respond to their behaviour today, matters tomorrow. This can mean that an easier decision that you make today may come back to bite you tomorrow. Focus on getting it right at home and it will help when you are in public. Be consistent, help them to understand the expectations and hopefully when you are at the checkout with a trolley full of groceries, you can avoid the tantrums that follow when you say no to them wanting a chocolate!

Discipline is a Good and Natural Part of Life

When I reflect on my own parenting I am thankful for the discipline my parents imposed on me. Like most kids I liked to push the boundaries and often needed to learn things the hard way. Yet discipline is a key characteristic of life. It takes discipline to get up in the morning and go to school or work. It takes discipline to listen and to care for yourself and others. John Piper say's "Save your children for joy, not for selfishness by ensuring you teach them to be obedient to both you and our heavenly Father."

"Blessed is the one whom God corrects; so do not despise the discipline of the Almighty. For he wounds, but he also binds up; he injures, but his hands also heal. Job 5:17-18

There is plenty more to say on discipline. I encourage us all as a community to support each other as we bring up our children. The African proverb, "It takes a village to raise a child" is true. When communities and home and school work together, that puts us in a great position to love and care for our precious children.

Discipline in Sport

One of the many benefits of playing sport is the skills one learns. We become better at running, jumping, throwing, hitting and kicking (just to name a few), however we also become better at relationships, resilience, determination and importantly, discipline.

Throughout this term we have seen students display

discipline across all sports. Many have sacrificed sleep to turn up to early morning trainings or to leave for trips, some have sacrificed their lunchtimes socialising to train, others have embraced extremes of weather, all to achieve their goal (or team's goal) of success. Discipline is also shown in commitment to following the rules and set plays of a particular sport, which contributes to the ability to win a game.

SportNova says: "Discipline enables a person to think past his or herself and more for the society or team, considering the common good and how his or her behaviour can affect the progress of the team in the long term".

Conversely, teams and individuals that lack discipline are more likely to experience failure in their sport rather than success. This could be from not having enough discipline to train hard or sacrifice things, or it could be from a lack of discipline when playing - giving away penalties and fouls - or not following through with team strategies and therefore giving the opposition an advantage.

Within sport at Carinya, we encourage students to strengthen their discipline and to learn from their experiences, helping them to become disciplined individuals in all aspects of life.

What is your favourite food?


Chocolate. No, pizza. No, chocolate. Chocolate pizza? Can I say both?

Careers on Country at Trelawney Station



Building Update

In October 2021 we embarked on a series of building projects aimed at expanding and revitalising facilities for students from Years 7 to 12. These projects were progressively completed over the past 20 months with the science laboratories being occupied in July 2022 and all new facilities being completed by April 2023.

Callistemon Block: A Scientific Hub of Innovation

The renovations to the Callistemon block have truly electrified our Science learning environment. A highlight of the update are the Science Laboratories which are much larger than the old facilities and fully equipped to create a comfortable and collaborative space for hands-on experimentation and scientific exploration. The addition of ramps, stairs, and covered walkways / learning areas means that staff and students can safely access these new facilities rain, hail, or shine.

Callistemon Block: Student Amenities

The original secondary student amenities were constructed in the early 1990s and catered for the student community for almost three decades. It was no surprise that the expansion and replacement of these facilities was met with ecstatic enthusiasm. With 10 male and 10 female self-contained washrooms, this project more than doubled the capacity of this amenity for middle and senior school students.

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Eucalypt Block: A Reponse to Growth

The new Eucalypt block reflects Carinya's commitment to creating learning spaces which cater to various disciplines and talents. The classrooms have been designed to incorporate flexible layouts and modern amenities, whilst the new staff room is a welcoming space for our educators to collaborate and exchange ideas. Perhaps the most remarkable addition is the purpose-built music lecture theatre. This state-of-the-art venue was designed with acoustics in mind and will undoubtedly inspire students to scale new heights as they showcase their musical talents, delighting in the gifts received from the Lord Jesus.

Senior Study: Supporting HSC Studies

The expansion of the Senior Study facilities was completed to accommodate the growing number of students in Years 11 and 12. Over the past decade, the number of students completing HSC studies at Carinya has increased by 50%, and it is projected to further increase by 25% in the next decade. To prepare for this growth, a second covered outdoor area was added, along with increased capacity in the indoor quiet study area. The location of both the Head of Senior School and School To Work office in the Senior Study ensures convenient access to necessary support for our HSC students.



Funding Building Developments

The value of these works totalled \$5,150,000, and represent a fantastic investment for the Carinya community. Considering that the development included Science Laboratories and the Music Lecture Theatre, the total cost of \$2,580 per m² for these works is a great result.

A combination of fee income and bank loans were used to pay for the works. Ultimately it is the fees paid by our school families which not only supports the day-to-day operations of the school but also provides the capital required to fund the works and repay the bank loans used.

As always we are thankful to our Lord Jesus for all the blessings He provides. Our facilities are only important in so far as they provide the opportunity for us to engage as a community to discover a world made through Jesus for his glory.

The completion of our building updates marks a significant milestone. The revitalised secondary school facilities have breathed new life into our school, fostering a dynamic and inspiring learning environment. With that accomplished, our focus has now shifted towards constructing a new car parking facility at the south of the site. This will be followed by a new Kindergarten to Year 2 facility to the east of the site, and ultimately, a new Administration building. Development works are projected to continue until 2026 and whilst they will cause some disruptions, planning is underway to minimise the impact and ensure that we provide the best possible facilities for future generations

The word discipline conjures up many different images for different people. For some it will have negative connotations, but for others it will be seen as a positive concept.

To be a person who is 'disciplined', means that someone is establishing good habits and trying to break bad ones. What might this look like in the Middle School student? It could look like someone who gets up and exercises in the mornings, despite the cold weather, or a budding musician who allocates time to practising their instrument, or someone who starts their tasks early and faithfully completes them. It could also be that someone is practising positive behaviours, like treating others with kindness, being empathetic or listening to others rather than being the person who always has to speak, putting others first and themselves last.

At Carinya, we want to mould and shape students into Christlikeness. This means that we care about the way they behave as well as the way they treat other people. We do not expect our students to be perfect, and school is a safe place to make mistakes. Most mistakes that our students make are recoverable. Students at Carinya should know that their teachers care about them by the way they are treated. I often say to students, 'If we didn't care about you, we wouldn't talk to you about your behaviour'.

In the same way our heavenly Father cares about us, we try, in our imperfect ways, to care for our students.

Hebrews 12:4-11 talks about discipline as loving.

And you have forgotten that word of encouragement that addresses you as sons: "My son, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when he rebukes you, because the Lord disciplines those he loves, and he punishes everyone he accepts as a son."

Why is discipline so great? Employees tell us often that they love to employ students from Carinya because they show selfdiscipline. They can be trusted to independently get on with their work, they can dress appropriately and they can think about others before themselves. What fantastic character traits these are! As always, we are thankful to the Lord for the privilege it is to partner with you in the education of your children.

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Term 2 certainly felt like a busy term - a term full of learning, excursions and sport. Students and staff enjoyed being able to engage in a variety of learning and extra-curricular activities.

It was a delight to see the students exploring the gifts that God has given them in a range of different contexts. I hope you enjoy some of the photos and memories from Term 2.

Term 3 for Senior School students is a busy term and for a number of students involves some significant changes. Year 11 will have their final term before their HSC commences, Year 10 will start the process of choosing their Stage 6 subjects and Year 12 will finish their final term of classes before commencing their HSC Examinations.

The temptation for some parents is to relax and withdraw in these final stages of schooling. The topic of 'discipline' may feel less relevant for parents of Senior School students. Arguably though, it is during these times that children require more guidance and 'discipline'. Research suggests that consistent and appropriate discipline practices can have positive long-term effects on children's development. These effects include improved selfcontrol, academic achievement, social skills, and mental health. An authoritative parenting style, characterized by setting clear rules and expectations while being warm and responsive, has been associated with positive outcomes for children. This style combines discipline with support and nurture, fostering healthy emotional development^{1, 2.}

A healthy family is one where there are clear rules and consequences. Relaxing the boundaries under the modern pretense of developing 'independence and autonomy' is doing no favours to children and is not supported by research³. There may be a myriad of reasons today why the drawing of boundaries and the maintenance of expectations seems to have declined but the clear evidence is that healthy, caring and responsible young adults have those factors as a common experience in their upbringing.

It is often felt that relaxing the boundaries gives children a wholesome freedom, but the opposite is the case. Children are never freer than when they operate within well-defined boundaries.

They know what they can and can't do, they know what impact 2019;28(1):168-81. their actions will have on people around them and they learn that actions have consequences. 






NORTH WEST CAREERS EXPO Year 10 & 12


