LEARNING THROUGH SERVING

Violent video games and movies have become an unfortunate part of many children's lives. Producers look for ways to shock audiences with graphic content for the sake of entertainment. Yet the humorous quote above shows the other side of the coin; the intrinsic desire to help those in need.

The Bible shows us that relationships are a fundamental part of our existence. We live and learn through our interactions with other people. It is natural, then, that school communities must capitalise on relationships to improve learning and help prepare children for life. Yet, while our children are more connected than ever before through social media, there is a very real and troubling disconnection that is harming our young people.

Clinical adolescent psychologist, Andrew Fuller, provides 10 tips for developing resilience in children. It is no surprise that the top two tips are:

- MAKE CONNECTIONS: Teach children how to make friends and develop empathy. Encourage them to be a friend in order to get friends. Connecting with people provides social support and strengthens resilience.
- **HELP OTHERS:** Teach children how to help others. Children who may feel helpless can be empowered by helping others through acts of kindness. Ask for help with a task they can master.

Developing healthy relationships is based on children knowing how to help and serve each other. Through this approach, children take their eyes off themselves and their own problems and use their strengths to help others. This in turn develops their emotional intelligence, problem solving ability and confidence. There is unique wisdom therefore in living in the way Jesus calls us to live.

How do you think your schooling at Carinya has influenced you?





CYBER SAFETY

Carinya was very pleased to host Tamworth Police, Youth Liaison Officer, Senior Constable Dani Witton in Week 6 of Term 2. Senior Constable Witton spoke to Year 8 about the risks of social media including:

- Sexting
- Cyberbullying
- Laws surrounding social media


Senior Constable Witton has a keen interest in informing young people about the immediate, medium-term and long-term consequences of these types of behaviours. She talked about how images, once placed on the internet, are there forever and can ruin family and personal relationships, as well as employment prospects in the future.

Once images are placed on the internet, they are there forever.

The presentation included information about talking to a trusted adult, be it a parent or carer, teacher or police officer, if students become involved on any level with sexting or cyber bullying. There was also information from the Office of the eSafety Commissioner about places to go to get help.

Senior Constable Witton outlined the privileged position our students are in by attending a school where mobile phones are not allowed during the day, and how this is a protective factor in these types of offences.

The main message for the day though was very clear; don't upload any photo of yourself that you would not be happy for your parents and grandparents to see.

During Term 2 students enjoyed some activities at lunchtime including a football competition and Laser Blitz Battle. Both these events were thoroughly enjoyed and helped keep kids active and healthy during our lunchtimes.


FOOTBALL COMP

YEAR 8 TECHNOLOGY

Sustainability can be defined as looking after the needs of the current generation, without compromising the needs of future generations.

Living in a sustainable manner is more important today than ever. With 7.7billion people living in the world, resources are becoming increasingly scarce. Working out how to live in a sustainable way, provides a great way for people to look after the needs of others and the environment in which we live.

Sustainability is a key concept in the Australian curriculum and features in units of work across the school. Year 8 Technology has currently been learning about sustainability through the production of micro herbs and vegetables. Here students grow their own products and, throughout the unit, are responsible for their management through watering, weeding, mulching, fertilising and pest control.


