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from the Principal DISCOVERING GOD'S WORLD



Great are the works of the Lord, studied by all who delight in them.

Psalm 111:2

Over the course of the history of the world many people have dedicated their lives to discovering new things about God's world or about the very nature of humanity. God made us with an intrinsic desire to want to discover His endless universe and the mysteries which it contains. We see this awe and wonder in the delight seen in the eyes of children as they discover something new.

On the recent Year 9 Excursion, students explored a canyon in the Blue Mountains. After putting on a wetsuit, they plunged into the icy waters of the Grand Canyon. They found the joy of discovering a section of the world that they never knew existed. Looking up at the towering sandstone cliffs, eroded over time, gave them a sense of how small they were. At one point there was an audible gasp from the students as they admired the majesty of God's glory through this one closed in section of the canyon.

While discovery is wonderful in and of itself, it also leads us to ask questions about the world and about ourselves. It prompts us to ask big questions like, "where did I come from?" and "what is my purpose in life?" As beautiful, magnificent and glorious as our creation is, it will never fully satisfy our hearts.

Author C.S. Lewis said, *"I believe in Christianity as I believe that the sun has risen: not only because I see it, but because by it I see everything else."* Discovery, therefore, leads us to the greater purpose of knowing the God who created the universe and who put the stars in place. Discovery also gives us meaning, as we seek to use the things we learn about the world for God's glory.

I hope as you look at this addition of the Carinya Connect you will find delight in the things your children have discovered about the world this year and, as they learn new things, that you will point them to Jesus, the author of creation and share in the wonder of our endlessly creative saviour. When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, and the son of man that you care for him?

As usual, the first event in the school calendar is the Swimming Carnivals. It was fantastic to be able to welcome parents back to the carnivals this year. Our Year 12 students organised a range of activities for our Kindergarten to Year 4 students and then backed up to swim in the Twilight carnival and win the Carinya Cup.

Our trips around the state commenced with our Zone Swimmers heading to Newcastle to compete in the Hunter Zone Carnivals with some qualifying to State and CIS Swimming. Our hockey girls travelled to Campbelltown to compete in the CSSA State Hockey gala day and won the Opens girls division. Our cricketers went to Glen Innes and Singleton to compete in the CSSA State Knockout Cricket Competition, with the U15s progressing through to the Grand Final (to be played in Term 2).


BE BRAVE. MAKE CHANGE. NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2022

The Book Nook

REVIEW: Big questions deserve good answers

There are lots of questions people ask where the answer doesn't really matter (What is for dinner? Should I buy the red shirt or the blue shirt?). But there are other questions where the answers really do matter (What happens when we die? Is Christianity really true? Do I matter?). Chris Morphew is an Australian author and a school chaplain who seeks to answer some really big questions that people ask in a way that is clear, thoughtful and easy to read. (He has also authored some of the Zac Power books).

Chris has written books that help answer these really important questions. The books are: 'How Do We Know That Christianity Is Really True?', 'What Happens When We Die?' and 'Why Does God Let Bad Things Happen?' He takes these questions seriously and gives winsome, sensitive and theologically sound answers that people will find engaging as he helps readers think through these serious, difficult and important questions.

Chris works through the questions that people ask and then explains what the Bible has to say about these and many other questions. He covers topics like:

- Does God actually care about my suffering?
- Will the world be this way forever?
- Investigating the empty tomb
- How do I get eternal life with God?

These books are written for a teenage audience and are approximately 80 pages and 10 chapters in length. They would be appropriate to give to children to read by themselves, to work through with a parent, or to use as a family devotion. They are also good for adults to read, too.

Chris has a new book out called 'Who Am I and Why Do I Matter?' These are questions that teenagers (and others) ask all the time, and if this book is as good and helpful as his previous books, the reader will be well "fed", with solid answers to these significant questions.

At Carinya we want to say to students over and over that they are personal creations of a purposeful God, and therefore we matter because we are made in the image of God: we are made by Jesus and for Him. This gives our lives meaning and purpose as we seek to live for Jesus in our lives and learning.

I would recommend these books to teenagers and families who want good answers to big questions.

Extraordinary **Discoveries in Ordinary Things**

If you were to visit the Kindergarten Preparatory Program at Lilly Pilly Cottage after morning tea, you would see children outside, hats on, with lots of movement and chatter. Each day is filled with seemingly ordinary things, which independently can seem very incidental, however we invite you to look a little closer at what our children are discovering in this Christ-centred, play-based, learning environment.

A child riding a bike is learning to move both his left and right legs in different positions simultaneously. He is improving his depth perception as he plans his route and modifies his speed to move around others in the playground. Higher order thinking is beginning to emerge as he adjusts his speed and his force on the pedals to navigate bumpy terrain.

The Art Space provides a scaffold for imagination and creativity as children experiment with different art mediums. Paintings evolve from marks on a page into recognisable shapes and objects. Children refine their fine motor skills as they draw what they see and know.

The girl on the swing twisting and spinning, is learning where her body fits in space and discovering cause and effect as she pumps her feet and hands to get propulsion. She is learning to balance risk and safety as she pushes herself higher and higher. Friends call out asking for a turn, providing an opportunity to consider and serve others with increasing joy.

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Sand in pockets and shoes are a reminder of the time spent pouring and building, strengthening core muscles, increasing mathematical awareness, and collaborating to build sandcastles, forts, and dinosaur caves. Imagination kicks into high gear as stories, new and old, are acted out whilst sand squishes between the toes.

Sitting quietly under the trees, children gather to read books, carefully turning pages, absorbing the pictures and words as they discover more about God and His world. Lips recite well-loved stories, anticipating rhyming words and predicting endings. Laughter rings at the absurdity of a 'dog on a log with a frog' and a passion for literacy grows.

> Educators move between children, spending time developing skills, encouraging social interactions, modelling dispositions for learning, mending hearts, patching knees, and weaving the Biblical truths into conversations, reminding each child that they are made by God, in His image and for His glory.

> > In many ways, our days in the playground at the Kindergarten Preparatory Program are very ordinary. We link home and school together in the cycle of play, eat, rest and repeat. However, in the ordinary nature of play, children discover the extraordinary nature of God and the joy that it is to see God's handiwork in all things.

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Thinking God's Thoughts After Him

Many people think that education is value neutral, that it is just about teaching facts and skills. This could not be further from the truth. Every education system is based on a belief system. How much time is allotted to each subject reflects how much importance a society places on that subject. As beliefs in society change, so does school curriculum, but *how* the curriculum is delivered still depends on the beliefs of those who teach it.

One of the big questions of education is, *where does knowledge come from?* At Carinya, we answer this in our motto: "From Christ and For Him". All things were created by God and for God, so all learning must have a Christian perspective. The world cannot be rightly understood without God, as it is Jesus who gives meaning and purpose to life. Johannes Kepler, a famous scientist, said that ideas and discovery are just "*thinking God's thoughts after Him*."

At Carinya, the entire fabric of the educational journey is woven together by our knowledge and understanding of God and, in Junior School, it is expressed every day as children sing songs, hear stories, create art, do experiments, ask questions and develop relationships. Children are taught about why, when and how to use the written word, along with the importance and power of the words we choose, just as God chose to communicate with us through his Word. As teachers read and study stories with children, the motives and actions of characters are examined from a Christian perspective of right and wrong. The logic, order and beauty of Mathematics and Science are a reflection of God's own creativity and character, and part of the very fabric of God's world. Every subject is, at its core, revealing God to us, and children are discovering more and more about God's world every day.

Knowing that all knowledge comes from God, and that learning is just thinking God's thoughts after Him, builds a solid framework for learning. As a learning community we seek to teach children to discover God's world in a spirit of cooperation, collaboration, faithfulness and service. By learning to discover God's world in this way, our children are given a strong foundation for how they think and act.

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Resilience is an end-point to our enjoyment of taking on experiences that are hard." - Beau Miles, Wild Magazine, Summer 2021

Christ, Community and Discovery are themes that heavily influence the Carinya excursion program. As students explore the richness of God's world, they are exposed to experiences that may not be comfortable. Placing students in challenging situations is a deliberate part of our excursion program, aimed at developing resilience in students. Through the challenges students face, they discover that they are able to push through their fears, grow in their relationships with others and develop important aspects of their character.

Over the years we have found that resilience is becoming an issue in our school community. An article from SACS Consulting from 2019 says that 'In fact, it turns out that there is significant evidence that resilience has declined in young people. Rates of anxiety and depression have increased and direct measures of resilience which have been used longitudinally are showing declines in this important psychological characteristic. SACS cites 2 main causes from the literature, helicopter parenting and screens.

In terms of helicopter parenting- 'there is a consistent view that across the western world parenting these days is more risk averse, harm avoiding, and likely to intervene to solve problems for children than previously. When parents step in to solve the problems of their children they send a couple of very important messages:

• The world is a dangerous place, so you had better fear it.

• You are unable to solve this problem yourself so I had better do it.' *Source Article: "Are Young People Less Resilient Than They Used to Be" by Andrew Marty (SACS Consulting)

David Gillespie's book 'Teen Brain' is an excellent resource for navigating parenting in the era of the smartphone and screens.

More recently, COVID and the media attention surrounding it has also increased rates of anxiety and fear amongst young people. As a school community, this means we have to work harder to equip our students with the tools to become more resilient. Sometimes this means making children feel uncomfortable for a short period of time in a safe supportive environment, to help them develop the skills they need to cope better when life really does become more challenging.

Reading the Bible, and explaining and discussing God's plan of salvation through his son Jesus are important aspects of our excursions, and the lens through which our students are encouraged to understand the world. The Bible does not try to hide the fact that life is sometimes hard, yet through faith we grow in endurance, perseverance and hope. These are wonderful qualities that we want our children to have as they learn to become adults in an increasingly complicated world.



Work Experience

Work experience placements are a valuable avenue through which students can learn about the workplace, gain skills and confidence in the adult world of work, as well as gaining first hand ideas about occupations they are considering pursuing. The Work Experience program has been in operation for many years at Carinya, and each year there are students who gain employment through their placement; those who clarify their post-school step; those who realise more about themselves and the work they enjoy; and those who realise that the full-time work life is hard, and consequently have renewed commitment to school and study.

Year 10 will complete two weeks of compulsory work experience during the last two weeks of Term 2 (Week 1 - Tuesday 14th June to Friday 17th June; Week 2 - Monday 20th June - Friday 24th June).

Year 10 have been preparing for their Work Experience placement throughout Term 1. They completed the My Future Finder Questionnaire, which is a career inventory that seeks to identify student skills, interests and abilities and matches them up with potential careers and courses that they could complete post-school. A representative from UNE (University of New England) then led a workshop with Year 10, so that they could understand and maximise their results.

Mrs Davis spent a lesson with each Year 10 class explaining the process of organising work experience placements. Whilst students are expected to make a plan and approach employers on their own in order to gain confidence in speaking to employers, they are encouraged to ask Mrs Davis for help, while at school or via email if they are uncertain, anxious, or need assistance.

Mrs Davis will check in regularly with Year 10 throughout the term and will conduct a Work Health Safety Session with Year 10 prior to their placement. A Year 10 teacher will call and visit (Tamworth placements only) students while on Work Experience.

It is very common for students to feel anxious about approaching employers and going into unfamiliar places, and we are eager to support students who are experiencing enhanced levels of anxiety. Parents are encouraged to work through the process of applying for placements with their child, while encouraging them to take ownership of their future by tackling as many of the steps of application as possible. Parents are also encouraged to make contact with Mrs Davis if they have questions or concerns.

Mrs Davis is available for appointments on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, or by email throughout the week.

Jesus forgives a paralytic Read Mark 2:1-5



Sometimes we think it is very clear and obvious what we, or others, need. But is it really as clear as we think? It's easy to assume that what a paralytic person needs most is the ability to walk. However, when the four friends did everything they could to get the paralytic man to Jesus, he does not heal the man straight away. Instead, he says, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

THINK: Why doesn't Jesus heal the man physically straight away? Physical healing wasn't this man's greatest need. Having his sins forgiven was of far greater importance than anything else he could ever need because it is our sins that separate us from God, deny us eternal life and mean we stand under God's just wrath. In forgiving this man's sins, Jesus gives him a far greater gift than physical healing.

The dictionary definition of forgive is: to stop blaming or being angry with someone for something that person has done, or to not punish them for something.

When we talk about being forgiven by God, it means that God treats us as if we never sinned, we are right with Him and He does not count our sins against us.

<u>REFLECT:</u> What is your greatest need right now? When Jesus forgives the paralytic in verse 5, He is declaring that He has come to fulfill our greatest need. Our greatest need is not in our temporary earthly concerns; physical healing, wealth or material possessions. Our greatest need is to be rescued from our sins so we can enjoy eternity with our heavenly Father.

Jesus heals a paralytic Read Mark 2:6-12



THINK: Why is it important that God forgave first, then healed? When Jesus says, "your sins are forgiven", no one can prove or disprove that it has actually happened. There is no visible evidence to confirm Jesus' power and authority to forgive sins. Since Jesus proved his power and authority to do the second *visible miracle* (physical healing), it verified that he also has the power and authority to do the first invisible miracle (forgiveness of sins).

<u>REFLECT</u>: Time and time again, Jesus not only tells us about His power and authority, but he backs up his claims, proving his power and authority to us through his Word. How does this story impact your belief that Jesus is not only who he says he is, but that he has the power to forgive and heal you?



Lord God, today we ask for forgiveness for we know that we are sinners and that we cannot save ourselves. We pray that you impart to us your wisdom to understand that we shouldn't strive for the temporary, earthly things, but for something that will last forever, which is to spend eternity with you in heaven. Please fill us with Your Holy Spirit and guide us in everything that we do. This we pray, in the Mighty Name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

Wowee, Jesus is now being accused of blasphemy (disrespecting God) by presuming to have God's authority to forgive sins. Jesus knew that on the inside, they believed His words were meaningless and powerless. So, in response to these accusations, Jesus then physically heals the paralytic man.
