Tollow THE LEADER

Leadership is a topic which often draws a great deal of attention. There are countless books that have been written on the topic of leadership and it is a common theme for many TED talks. If we reflect on our own lives there are people we have been influenced by, followed and worked under; we all follow a leader. The question is "who do we follow and why?"

"To what will you look for help if you will not look to that which is stronger than yourself?"

CS Lewis

An American Pastor, Jonathan Pokluda, wrote an article called "How to Ruin Your Life in Your Twenties." In the article he stated that we are who we hang out with. In other words the people we associate with have a strong influence on our language, thinking, beliefs and ideas. It comes as no surprise that for young people this influence is even stronger as they navigate finding their own identity in their teenage years. As parents we need to speak into this space and consider:

- •Who do our children follow?
- •How do our children lead and influence others?

There is more emphasis in modern culture on leading others well, than encouraging people to follow well. The Bible speaks most about who we need to follow. And as the Scriptures testify, it is right to help your children to be a follower.

Whoever walks with the wise becomes wise, but the companion of fools will suffer harm.

Proverbs 13:2

We need to encourage our children to follow others wisely. This means getting them to think who they follow and why, as well as considering if their influence is positive or not. It is like the quote from CS Lewis, "who do we need to look for help; we need someone stronger than ourselves."

The Bible shows us that while we desire to follow people, we are first made to follow Jesus. The Bible provides endless examples of very ordinary people who God chose to lead. It was not their charisma or leadership skills which led to success but God at work in them. Being first led by him shaped their identity, purpose, decision making and character. This is also true of us.

Charles Spurgeon, a famous preacher in the 18th Century said, "Man was made in the image of God, and nothing will satisfy man but God, in whose image he was made." We want our children to follow Jesus and we want them to lead and influence others well. Colossians 3:17 says "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

At Carinya we want to develop children of character above personality, and to be children that are not easily led in the wrong directions. **To follow Jesus first and others wisely.**





Excursions are a compulsory part of our school curriculum and students are required to attend.

Waratah Project

The Waratah Project Networking - Term 4

The recent Waratah Project Networking Workshop held at Macleay Vocational College met the trifold purpose of ongoing AIS support for Waratah Project schools to both summarise their progress throughout 2022 and develop deeper understandings of On-Country learning and trauma informed care.

On Thursday, we visited a number of on country locations, to engage with and learn from the local Dunghutti community to develop a deep understanding for listening and learning from Country, especially Aboriginal knowledge and management of the land and waterways. We were immersed in traditional knowledge about landforms and waterways through stories and special places, cultural practice, kinship, knowledge, songs and art. We visited sites at Crescent Head and South West Rocks. Of particular interest was the Koala management strategy by the Fig Tree Descendants Aboriginal Corporation Descendents. The group recognise the values of the koala as an important cultural feature of the South West Rocks landscape and the importance of embedding Aboriginal cultural knowledge in all aspects of koala conservation and management. We were privileged to both hear and learn some story, songs and sign language to teach children in Junior School about Koala conservation, and also visited some Koala habitat trees in the Arakoon National Park.

At the Friday AIS conference, the key speakers were survivors from Kinchela Boys Home. They each told their story of their forcible removal from their family, assimilation, hard farm labour and often brutality experienced at the home.

They talked of life after the home and the intergenerational continued trauma, linked to their children and grandchildren as a result. The session was deeply impactful and provided insights into the impact of trauma and the ongoing effects from generation to generation.

Another exciting highlight of the Waratah Project was the involvement of members of our Hub Group from Carinya and the Gawura School attending the 2022 WIPCE conference in Adelaide. The conference drew educators from across the globe to share successes and strategies for culturally grounded education, attracting education experts, practitioners, scholars, students and communities, making the conference one of the largest and most diverse indigenous education forums in the world. The conference featured a program of keynote presentations, networking, interactive workshops, yarning circles and master classes with a rich and diverse cultural program.



What a year 2022 was. I feel like it's been said a lot, but as sport gets back to normal post-Covid, we have seen our students whole-heartedly re-engage in sport. Over 300 students in Year 3-12 are participating in extracurricular sport, ranging from local team sports to gala days and carnivals. School swimming, cross country and athletics carnivals meant that the majority of students are relishing the chance to engage in physical activity. Tamworth Netball will be running a weekly clinic during school for Year 1-5 students in Term 1 2023. It is hoped that these clinics will give the students the skills and confidence to participate in both our Carinya Netball and Basketball teams.

Follow The feader

As a Primary School child, most people probably played the game, "Follow the leader." This created class unity and taught children to work together. It is a simple game where one child is the leader and everyone else has to copy their actions. Leadership isn't really about being the one in charge and having everyone else do exactly what you tell them. In fact, as children learn to lead, taking the, "I'm the boss, do what I tell you," approach brings much conflict. No matter whether the position of leadership is formally recognised or not, someone will lead, for good or bad. What qualities should we encourage in children who show leadership?

Firstly, we want the leader to be trustworthy. If they say they will do something, they do it. We encourage them to commit to something and not wait for a better offer. This could be as simple as they have been invited, and accepted, an invitation to Suzie's party and then Maggie invites them. They really would prefer to go to Maggie's party but they have already committed to Suzie. As a person of their word, they go to Suzie's party. The Bible puts it simply: let your yes be yes and your no be no (Matthew 5:37, James 5:12). This quality of trustworthiness is something we must help our children develop.

Servant-heartedness is the second quality we want to encourage in our children. Good leadership is not about being in-charge but about helping those around you. History is full of 'leaders' who forgot this - people like Emperor Nero and King Henry VIII. At best, they leave a trail of damaged and broken people behind them. We often talk, at Carinya, to Junior School children about being Community Builders. Good leaders are always community builders! DON'T

They look for ways to make the school better today than it was yesterday. As a child, this could be asking a child who is on their own to play with them, or simply picking up a piece of rubbish as they walk by. Jesus is, of course, the ultimate example of the servant leader. He had all the power yet chose to serve. He was never self-seeking, rude, demanding or boastful.

Even as a young child, we want leaders who embrace change, whose mindset is one of growth. This is not always easy! A good leader recognises that everybody can grow and change. The whole process of schooling is based on learning new skills and knowledge. A good student leader is going to enjoy the process of learning, faithfully applying themselves and encouraging others to act likewise. Part of this process of growth and change is being able to forgive others when they get it wrong. Children are learning all the time what it means to be friends, to live and work in community - they are going to make mistakes. Nobody wants those mistakes held against them forever. Even as a child, a good leader will forgive others when they make mistakes and allow them to change.

As adults we don't often think about leadership in children. In a K-6 school we might think about it in terms of Year 6 leaders. In a K-12 school it jumps further as we focus on Year 12 students. This shouldn't be the case though as children, no matter the age, can be leaders. Encouraging good qualities such as trustworthiness, servant-heartedness and a growth mindset, so that they lead well, is what our focus should be.

Play Therapy

For children, toys are their words and play is their language

For children, play is their first form of communication. For this reason Play Therapy is considered an appropriate form of counselling to be used with children aged 3 - 11 years and beyond. Toys, sand, art, drama and music are used to help children 'play out' what is happening for them in a safe and supportive environment.

Play Therapy is also used in groups to help children learn about acceptable behaviours with peers and learn about how they can be supportive towards others in their own life.

Carinya will be starting Play Therapy in Term 1, 2023 with Melinda Attard. Many of you may know Mrs Attard as an Education Assistant in Junior School. Melinda also has a Bachelor of Education in Early Childhood and a Graduate Diploma in Counselling. Her love of children's play, communicating with children combined with her counselling skills, has led to the introduction of Play Therapy at Carinya.

Examples of students using play therapy might be; when out of character behaviour arises, change in family situation or loss. If you feel this is relevant to your child, please speak with your child's classroom teacher.

Collaboration with parents will be done prior to the session. Sessions will be approximately 30 minutes and students can be seen up to five times, and if needed, referred to external therapists.

We are excited to introduce Play Therapy at Carinya and hope that it will help the children in our community.





Sometimes at netball training we play 'follow the leader' as a warm up activity. Why do we do this? There are so many reasons. One player gets to be the leader, and they love it. Players have to pay attention to the leader, they have to follow the directions, they are using their brains as well as their bodies and it's fun. The leader also has a responsibility to lead the players well.

As we emerged from the shadow of COVID last year, Year 8 did some work in Pastoral Care where they thought about the ways in which they could lead in Senior School. 1. When did you finish school?

I finished school a long, long time ago in 2008 – even before the time of ATAR.

2. What was your favourite subject at school?

Physics and in particular the medical physics elective.

3. What was your favourite excursion when you were at school?

The optional excursion in Year 9 to the Kingdom of Tonga. This was a real eye-opener to how people live in a country with far less than we have here in Australia. Despite how little the people of Tonga have, they share everything they can – this was inspiring.

4. What was your dream job you were hoping to do when you were at school?

I really wanted to become a doctor.

5. What has been the best movie or book you have read since leaving school?

Can I break the rules here and mention my favourite podcast (how very modern)? The podcast Undeceptions by Dr John Dickson has been a real source of fascination and encouragement to me. To be brief, I have enjoyed listening to this podcast as it answers a lot of questions about Christianity - not shying away from the hard ones – and shines a light on how through one man in history, Jesus Christ, the world has been radically changed for the better. I would encourage all – current students and adults – to listen free online to this one-of-a-kind series, and I hope you find it as helpful and fascinating as I have!

6. What were some of the things you enjoyed about your time at Carinya?

Carinya is a unique school that has strong convictions and aims to function by those convictions. No matter the school subject or staff member interacted with, Jesus' impact on the world is made evident frequently. There is also something nice about the school including children from prep until year 12, where older kids can be role models for the younger ones.

7. What have you done since you left school? (study/ work/ family/ what and where?)

As I mentioned earlier, my dream job was to study to become a doctor, however I missed the mark and was instead accepted into my back-up plan which was into Newcastle Uni for Medical Radiation Science, which I ended up really enjoying and so I stuck with it, graduating in 2011. In my graduating year, I married my wife Nilm and together we have two girls, Elena and Grace. In terms of work, I have worked for the same company since 2012 as a radiographer, taking x- rays, and performing CT scans. I am currently training to do MRI scans with a machine that has a magnet 60,000 times stronger than Earth's magnetic field – it's incredible, and expensive!

8. Where do you live and what is your job now?

We live in Tamworth and I am currently working as a radiographer at Castlereagh Imaging.

9. What advice do you have for kids in Year 12 and as they think about life after school?

Advice I would love to be able to go back and tell myself when I was in Year 12: your life is not defined by your HSC mark or what job you pursue afterwards. Far more important is being faithful in all that you do, whether studying or working.

10. What is one way Jesus has changed your life?

Jesus has imparted on me a real sense of the infinite worth of each person in the world. Every individual person has been made in His image which separates us from any other part of creation. One practical way this truth impacts my daily life is at work, where I have the privilege of looking after patients, some who are very unwell, to make them as comfortable as possible when they are receiving scans for various reasons. Knowing each person is made in His image encourages me to treat every patient with dignity and respect. Jesus demonstrated this truth on many occasions where He showed love and compassion toward all kinds of people, from the rich and self-important, to the lowest outcasts of society.





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
